Bands get set to battle for education

Local teens have planned a benefit concert for Free the Children, with proceeds directly supporting the building of schools in developing countries through the organization's Brick by Brick campaign. The concert will be from 7:30 p.m. to 11 p.m. March 6 at Dufferin Clark Community Centre, 1441 Clark Ave. W., Thornhill.

Founded in 1995 by then 12-yearold Toronto-area child rights activist Craig Kielburger, Free the Children is the world's largest network of children helping children through education.

"The Brick by Brick program is great because it empowers us to promote the importance of education while also raising money to build much-needed schools in places like Haiti, Kenya, Sierra Leone and Sri Lanka, among others," said 17-year old Eli Krapivnik, one of four teens involved in planning the event.

Hosted by two of the Toronto-area's leading Jewish teen movements - B'nai Brith Youth Organization (BBYO) and Canadian Young Judaea (CYJ) - the show will feature five local teen bands, said Kevin Goodman, program director at BBYO.

"The bands competing are all young local groups - Pursuit of Reality, Suburban Addiction and Vybe Tribe have so far been confirmed. Demand for auditions was high, and with only five spots, we're expecting an evening of phenomenal talent, while raising awareness as teens for a cause we're passionate about," said Simon Axelrod, representing CYJ on the event's planning committee.

Axelrod expects a crowd of about 200 teens. Each band will play a 40 minute set, with the top bands set to receive prizes that include gift certificates to stores and attractions as well as recording time courtesy of Soundhouse Studio.

The concert is an example of tikkun olam, organizers said, adding that helping to give every child an education is an important step in breaking the cycle of poverty for future generations.
