Teens to serve community

Five hundred Toronto-area teens will participate in an afternoon of community service on April 22.

They, along with 10,000 Jewish teens from around the world, will take part in J-Serve, the Global Day of Jewish Youth Service.

J-Serve is the Jewish service component of Youth Service America's annual Global Youth Service Day and also coincides with the fifth annual ChangeTheWorld – Ontario Youth Volunteer Challenge. The province's three-week challenge kicked off April 15 in partnership with Volunteer Canada's National Volunteer Week, Canada's largest celebration of volunteers, volunteerism and civic participation.

This year marks the third year in which Toronto-area teens will participate in the international initiative, thanks to funding by UJA Federation of Greater Toronto and the BBYO Panim Institute.

The Toronto project, hosted at the Anne and Max Tanenbaum Community Hebrew Academy of Toronto, Wallenberg campus, from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., has been coordinated by BBYO in an effort to encourage community building and connections across religious and societal lines.

"When registering at Jserve.ca, teens are asked to choose one of 16 service opportunities across the city," said Kevin Goodman, executive director at BBYO's Lake Ontario region. "The site also enables parents and community members to register as project chaperones to see first-hand the power

of 500 young people eager to impact their world."
